BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF COURSE

The course covers topics in the general humanities and the sciences, extended to more specific issues relative to students' academic disciplines. Students' language knowledge and skills are developed in the four language areas: reading, writing, listening and speaking. General vocabulary is expanded while introducing academic vocabulary. The student is prepared to present issues concerning his/her own scientific field and to exploit subject-related literature in English. The course aims to develop language competence that enables effective communication in academic environments as well as fluent and correct use of English for professional / scientific purposes. It also aims to equip students with language skills to enable them understand academic genres in scientific literature, prepare and present academic quality articles as well as participate at scientific conferences and debates. The course also includes taking language tests at B2 level according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages.

- b) Translating of texts: paying attention to linguistic nuances/ specifics in the target language; summary analyses, identifying errors and peer correcting.
- c) The use of impersonal passive voice and nominalization in writing.
- d) Presentation of conference papers and summary of doctoral dissertation.
- e) Understanding scientific texts identifying and defining unfamiliar terms, paraphrasing, translation exercises, enriching academic and specialist vocabulary.
- f) Towards the doctoral examination. Preparing summaries (individual consultations).

COURSE ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

A prerequisite for passing the course is the attainment of all the learning outcomes set, in particular a successful completion of all written and oral assignments scheduled for a given semester, as well as attendance and active participation in classes.

Assessment criteria:

- 5.0 the student demonstrates knowledge of each learning content at a level of 93%-100%
- 4.5 the student demonstrates knowledge of each learning content at a level of 85%-92%
- 4.0 the student demonstrates knowledge of each learning content at a level of 77%-84%
- 3.5 the student demonstrates knowledge of each learning content at a level of 69%-76%
- 3.0 the student demonstrates knowledge of each learning content at a level of 60%-68%
- 2.0 the student demonstrates knowledge of each learning content at a level of below 60%
