BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF COURSE (100-200 words)				

The aim of the course is to familiarize doctoral students with the theoretical foundations of psycholinguistics, define the scope of its research and determine its most important research methods. The definition of language in psycholinguistics will be introduced, the relationship between language and other sign systems will be presented. Issues such as psychologism in linguistics will also be outlined; the concept of linguistic and communicative competence; text and discourse; learning a second language; bilingualism; the conditions for the effectiveness of speech; verbal and pon-verbal communication; linguistic picture of the world; the basics of

communicative competence; text and discourse; learning a second language; bilingualism; the conditions for the effectiveness of speech; verbal and non-verbal communication; linguistic picture of the world; the basics of cognitivism, the psycholinguistic basis for creating and interpreting utterances. The aim of the course is also to develop the ability to use terminology in the field of psycholinguistics, discuss topics in the field of language and

Problem-solving lecture, problem discussion, group work.

### **COURSE CONTENT**

## 1. Lectures/ Seminars:

Psycholinguistics – basic concepts. History of psycholinguistics. Goals of psycholinguistics. Mental processes, enabling the acquisition and use of language. Theories of meaning and a critical view of

psycholinguistics. Biological basis of human linguistic behaviour. Language competence. Speech acts. Non-verbal communication and its forms. Stereotypes – autostereotypes and heterostereotypes. Discourse – its types. Politeness strategies. Individual factors influencing discourse.

## 2. Seminars / Lab classes/ others:

Words and meanings in terms of psycholinguistics. What is language according to linguists and psycholinguists? What goals do they set for themselves? Arguments in favour of the fact that words and meanings are separate notions, but also related to each other. Ways to determine the structure of a sentence and its understanding. Mental dictionary. Methods of its study. Language and thinking. Bilingualism. Impoverishing bilingualism (submersion) and enriching bilingualism (immersion). Children and bilingualism. Theories on the acquisition of a second language: linguistic, psycholinguistic and sociocultural approaches.
