Basic objectives of the course are:

- to obtain basic knowledge, skills and social competence allowing students to use rhetoric, self-presentation, and image creation efficiently;
- to obtain knowledge and skills required for effective use of verbal, paraverbal, and non-verbal means of communication;
- to develop skills of argumentation and discourse;
- to obtain skills required for performing basic types of public speaking;
- to obtain skills allowing students to prepare, analyse and perceive various texts, both spoken and written;
- to obtain knowledge and skills referring to means of defence against ad hominem argumentation;
- to obtain knowledge and skills of creating and performing presentations (including mind-mapping and concept-map), and the use of mnemonics and rules of savoir-vivre;

Lecture: Presentation of basic concepts of rhetoric, self-presentation, and image creation (with the use of multimedia tools)

Practicals: Discussion on the essence and basic rules of rhetoric, self-presentation, and image creation; Delivering rhetoric speeches and conducting presentations

### **COURSE CONTENT**

- 1. Classical rhetoric history, functions, types of rhetoric speech, styles, techniques and rules of rhetoric
- 2. Rhetoric speech construction (including self-promotion)
- 3. The art of argumentation
- 4. The art of self-promotion and image creation; self-promotional strategies
- 5. Modern art of rhetoric, including paraverbal and non-verbal communication; defence against ad hominem argumentation.

### **COURSE ASSESSMENT CRITERIA**

- 1. Pass mark shall be granted for preparation and independent delivery of a speech or presentation.
- 2. The topic of the speech or presentation is to be agreed with the tutor.
- 3. Assessment criteria:
- 1) very good grade (5.0) speech / presentation:
  - a) contains the right structure (introduction, development, conclusion)
  - b) contains arguments arranged according to rhetorical rules
  - c) contains at least: one topos, two rhetorical figures, two stylistic clues
  - d) was delivered entirely from memory

- e) has no significant errors in non-verbal communication
- f) was delivered with minimal stress
- 2) good plus (4.5)) speech / presentation:
  - a) contains the right structure (introduction, development, conclusion)
  - b) contains arguments arranged according to rhetorical rules
  - c) contains at least: one topos, one rhetorical figure, one stylistic clue
  - d) was delivered mostly from memory
  - e) has no significant errors in non-verbal communication
  - f) was delivered with slightly visible stress
- 3) good (4.0) speech / presentation:
  - a) contains the right structure (introduction, development, conclusion)
  - b) contains at least: one rhetorical figure, one stylistic clue
  - c) was delivered mostly from memory
  - d) has no significant errors in non-verbal communication
  - e) was delivered with minor signs of stress
- 4) satisfactory mark plus (3.5) speech / presentation:
  - a) contains the right structure (introduction, development, conclusion)
  - b) contains at least: one rhetorical figure, one stylistic clue
  - c) was delivered with minor use of notes
  - d) does not have important errors regarding non-verbal communication
  - e) was delivered with visible signs of stress
- 5) satisfactory grade (3.0) speech / presentation:
  - a) contains the right structure (introduction, development, conclusion)
  - b) contains at least: one rhetorical figure, one stylistic clue
  - c) was delivered with frequent use of notes

Activity

- d) does not have important errors regarding non-verbal communication
- e) was delivered with clearly visible signs of stress
