

Haris Dajč, Associate Professor at the Faculty of Philosophy, University of Belgrade, was born in 1983 in Belgrade. After graduating from the Department of History at the Faculty of Philosophy, he completed his Master's and Doctoral studies in Modern History at the Faculty of Philosophy. In addition, he completed his Master's studies at the UCL School of Slavonic and East European Studies. He also conducted numerous study visits, professional training courses, and research activities in London, Venice, Padua, Krakow, and Israel. His research interests include the Balkans and the Mediterranean in the period from the 18th to the 21st century, the history of Belgrade, the position of Jews in Yugoslavia after 1945, and the development of populism in the countries of former Yugoslavia. He is Nahum Goldman, Israeli Foreign Affairs YJLP, and Coimbra group alumni. He has been a visiting professor in Krakow (Jagiellonian University, Institute of European Studies) since 2019 and a visiting professor at the Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznan in 2022 and 2023. He was part of several research and academic projects funded by the EACEA, Erasmus Sport, Rothschild Foundation Hanadiv Europe, and the Serbian Ministry of Science. He was a Scientist in Charge of H2020 project Populist Rebellion against Modernity in 21st-century Eastern Europe: neo-traditionalism and neo-feudalism - Poprebel (Horizon 2020-funded research project on the rise of populism in Central and Eastern Europe), with a special focus on the dissolution of Yugoslavia and populist parties and on Russian influence in the former Yugoslav space. He was Scientist in Charge of Marie Skłodowska-Curie Innovative Training Network FATIGUE – Delayed Transformational Fatigue in Central & Eastern Europe: Responding to the Rise of Illiberalism/Populism. He published four books: The Dusk of the Old Mediterranean: The Ionian Islands 1774-1815 (2016), The Houses of Belgrade Jews 1920-1941 (2018), Sava Slope: Following the Path of Belgrade Urban Development 19-20th century (2019); The East Mediterranean: Great Britain and France in the Levant 1796-1807 (2020). He edited three books: Faces of Populism (Jagiellonian University Press 2023) with Natasza Styczynska, Contemporary Populism and its

Political Consequences (Institute Ivo Pilar Zagreb, 2022) with Isidora Jarić and Ljiljana Dobrovšak, Postepidemiološki stres: Istorijske i medicinske dileme (NDIZK and Faculty of Philosophy, 2024) with Nikola Samardžić and Nevena Divac. He is the chairman of the Serbian Cricket Federation.
