

Zofia Sawicka, PhD – a graduate of the Jagiellonian University with a degree in Oriental Philology, specializing in Arabic Studies, as well as Political Science with a specialization in Journalism. She was a Polish government scholarship recipient in Syria (Damascus) and an intern at the Polish Embassy in Damascus. She holds a Ph.D. in Social Sciences, specializing in Media Studies. From 2009 to 2020, she was employed at the University of Information Technology and Management in Rzeszów, initially as an assistant and later as an assistant professor, as well as a researcher at the Institute for Civilizational Studies. There, she focused on analyzing macro- and micro-level phenomena in the Middle East, monitoring areas of risk, identifying potential conflicts in the region, and examining intercultural communication. Since 2021, she has held the position of assistant professor at the Institute of Political Science at the University of Rzeszów, initially in the Department of International Relations and Human Rights, and currently in the Department of Human Rights. Her academic interests center around the broad issues of Arab countries, particularly with an emphasis on the political transformation of these nations following the Arab Spring, security in the region, and issues related to Islam. Additionally, she is interested in the role of media in political and social transformations in Poland and globally, as well as migration phenomena. She is a member of the Polish Oriental Society, the Polish Society for European Studies, and the Polish Political Science Association. Between 2013 and 2016, she worked on the project Islamism and Pluralism: Islamist Groups in Egypt and Tunisia After the Arab Spring (Sonata grant, 2011/03/D/HS5/01570). She is currently a contributor to the Regional Excellence Initiative project *Ukrainian Migrants in the Podkarpackie Voivodeship: Socio-Economic Implications,* where she is responsible for analyzing disinformation about refugees in the Podkarpackie region in political and media discourse, the integration of Ukrainian migrants into Podkarpackie society, and issues related to education.
